Dr. Pickell shared a message entitled "The Power of One" based on the woman at the well. He challenged us to find the "well" on our campuses and look for God-given opportunities to reach those that don't know Him.

On Saturday evening Pastor Greg Taylor and Andrea Thompson, PCM coordinator for Wisconsin, led out in an organizational meeting. Here we made connections and observations for the next steps in supporting Adventist youth in public schools.

Part of the master plan for PCM is creating a structure of leadership at the local church level. The goal is to find one individual for every district who will help connect our students to the local church. The church could open for a weekly student Bible study or activity. Another idea would be to start something on the public campus.

Reconnect With Those Taking a Break from Church

When you sit in church on a Sabbath morning, do you ever look around and wonder where they've gone? The people who once filled the now empty pews; the family with the troubled teen, the single mother with two active toddlers, the young adult with the purple hair, the middle aged man whose wife died last year, and the list goes on.

Why is it that these people no longer attend your church? Do you know? Why were they once active, but yet they seldom, if ever, attend, while still living in the same community? It is troubling that here in Wisconsin, while in the past 10 years we have had an increase of 854 members, attendance has dropped by 177. In 2004 53% of members attended church on a regular basis. In 2014 only 45% of members attended.

While applauding the evangelistic focus of our church, it is troubling that so many are wandering away from the church they once loved. Would it make a difference if we expended as much effort, time, and dollars, into reclaiming those who once worshipped with us, as we do inviting new people to become a part of our church family?

Research shows that most of those who have wandered away did so not because of doctrinal differences, but because of broken relationships. When they were asked what was the most important reason why they decided to stop attending church, 28% indicated that there was not a big issue; they just drifted away. 25% indicated that there was a lack of compassion for the hurting, 19% indicated a moral failure on their part, and 18% felt they did not fit.

These people are reach-able! If we are to restore people to again worship with us, we must repair and restore those connections. Through prayer and genuine friendship many can be led back, not only to church, but to a vibrant relationship with Jesus.

I invite you to seek out two or three that have wandered away. Pray for them, visit with them, listen to their hurts, and demonstrate God's unfailing love for them.

Lay Ministers Equipped and Serving Jesus



The Apostle Paul was used of God to establish the Christian Church in the first century. In his time, there were no professional clergy, no differentiation between clergy and laity, but there were spiritual gifts given by God for the growth, nurture and development of the infant church. "So Christ himself gave the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, the pastors and teachers, to equip his people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ." Eph. 4:11 NIV

The Wisconsin Conference has been training lay ministers for service for over 12 years. Committed Christians who feel called by the Lord into service are embraced by the church and invited into a lay minister's program that requires a minimum of two years of training and apprenticeship and sometimes more. When these lay ministers graduate from the training, they are called forward in the midst of the annual camp meeting to be set aside

for service with the laying on of hands and prayer.

While the training is provided at no charge to the candidates, they are responsible for their travel to training events (3 times per year), books for required reading, lodging and meals, and most importantly, the time and effort it takes to develop the skills and understanding to be an effective lay minister.

But what do you do when you graduate?

David Rawls was one of the first individuals to enlist in the program. He currently serves as the head elder in the Sturgeon Bay Church. David preaches, teaches, counsels, and prays with church members and interested people in Door County. Working with a local bakery, David picks up unsold bread each week and distributes it free of charge to scores of people who are grateful for the support and kindness. Pastor Bill Ochs, Senior Pastor of the Green Bay District, recognizes David's leadership and works with him in partnership for Jesus.

Nathan Skaife felt called to ministry from the time of his baptism in 2002. He entered the lay ministry program in 2005. He learned by doing ministry as well as studying ministry and found a joy in serving Christ that exceeded his satisfaction as a building contractor. He sold his business, went to Andrews University and earned his Bachelor's degree in Theology. He how serves as a professional pastor receiving his livelihood from the church. He was ordained to the gospel ministry last year. Pastor Skaife continues to practice ministry in the Waukesha District and not only gives Bible studies, preaches, and does evangelism, he trains and recruits his members into ministry.

Steven and Emily Goodenough aren't even members of the Wisconsin Conference . . . vet. Emily first learned of the lay ministers' training at Wisconsin camp meeting in 2005. A few years later, she travelled from her home in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, for the triennial training events. When she married Steven, they both embraced the program and proceeded to give leadership to a church plant in Cedar Rapids. In the Autumn of 2015, they felt called to relocate and be part of the ministry team of the Wisconsin Conference as volunteers. They have put their house up for sale in lowa, placed an accepted offer to purchase a home in the Milwaukee area, and are excited to be part of the team planting a new Adventist church on the west side of Milwaukee. They love giving Bible studies, meeting in fellowship groups to pray and study, and introducing people to a new relationship with Jesus and His church.

There are scores of additional stories just like these - common people called to uncommon service by an incredible Savior. People who provide inspiring leadership, invaluable service, and skilled ministry for the love of Jesus.

Over 40 people have finished the training and are doing wonderful things for Jesus. And there is still room for more!

Radio Station Opens in Wisconsin Rapids

In December of 2007, for the first time in 25 years, the Federal Communications Commission, or FCC, opened up the opportunity for anyone in the Wisconsin Rapids area to submit a full-power radio station construction permit for the 91.7 frequency. As you can imagine many wanted on board for this great opportunity.

Ben Moore, member of the Wisconsin Rapids Seventh-day Adventist Church felt impressed to apply. After speaking with their church board and the Wisconsin Conference Office, the Wisconsin Rapids Seventh-day Adventist Church united, joining the ranks with the 39 other entities vying for the spot. To their unbelief, the Lord stepped in and for the first time in 25 years they were chosen and granted the full power station.

Many challenges have faced WRAO-FM (Wisconsin Rapids Adventist Outreach Christian Radio 91.7) such as a filed lawsuit from a neighboring station, court litigation, paper work, and many lost hours delaying the process for several years, but by God's grace the station should be full power in the coming weeks.

This station has the capability to reach up to 300,000 people with the Three Angel's Message but as Dean Thomas, WRAO Radio Station manager says, "Our signal will



reach as far as the Lord wants it to reach... It's God's voice calling from the heart of Wisconsin."

A s we close out the finances for 2015, I am thankful to report that we ended the year with a 3.34% gain in tithe. In addition, we have experienced a gain of 8.28% for Wisconsin Budget (WB). As you can see on the WB chart, our churches overall have reached 90% of the new goal (with several churches individually surpassing the goal) increasing the giving to WB by 20% over the previous years. I praise God for this good report and how He has blessed you, our members.

I would also like to thank you for your faithfulness and response to God's love. I am also happy to report that every church reported their tithe and offerings in December and are up-to-date in the remittances to the conference. Thanks again to our local church treasurers for the many hours you put into this most important part of the work.

In addition to the increase in the offerings, it looks as though we will also come in a bit under budget for expenses for the year. This, combined with the offering increase, will help move our reserves in the right direction, as


we have had a loss over the past three or four years despite cutting the budget.

This past January 6-16, 2016, our students joined the world church in Ten Days of Prayer. "I really don't know exactly when I started praying," said sophomore Abby Fox, who plans to be part of the mission project to the Philippines this spring, "but I started praying for money to build the church in the Philippines." This was in addition to the money she was trying to raise for her own airfare. "I just felt like I should ask God to send a donation of ten thousand dollars." And so, with a few other girls, Abby began praying for \$10,000. The teachers began praying too that God would honor her bold request and not let her down.

Abby asked that when principal Roger Dunder began calling donors, he would tell her so she and the girls could be praying. "I was on my second or third call with potential donors," says Dunder, "and I suggested they give maybe two or three thousand dollars. But the donor said, 'No. I can't give two or three thousand. It has to be ten thousand. For the past 3 weeks the number ten thousand keeps popping in my head. I don't know why, I can't explain it, but I feel I must give ten thousand.

Tears began to flow as the realization of what God had done sunk in. As the news spread like wildfire through the girls' dorm and across the campus, shouts of joy rang out and prayers of thanksgiving ascended to our Almighty God who still answers prayers!

Let's take the advice of early missionary William Carey: "Expect great things of God Attempt great things for God."

Shoe Cutting Party at Petersen Elementary



Bible Labs, a time of service for others, is a monthly event at Petersen school. When teacher Leah Anderson learned about the need for shoes in Uganda she ordered the kit and planned a shoe cutting party.

The kids collected piles of old jeans, traced the shoe's 10 pattern pieces, and cut them out. One student kept a tally of shoe parts,

and a quality control student pinned and bagged the shoe pieces in sets, ready for the shoe-makers in Uganda to sew re-cycled tire pieces on as soles.



Most children in Uganda have no shoes, and small sand fleas, called jiggers enter the bare feet and lay their eggs. If left untreated,

jiggers cause infections, paralysis and even amputation. "I'm glad we can make these shoes," said a student after seeing feet infected by jiggers. The school kids hope to send enough jean pieces to make 40 pair of shoes for the children of Uganda.
