re we going to GYC?"
Kurtis Lam asked
during a Public Campus
Ministries retreat at Camp Wakonda. This
had never crossed our minds, but, after
much planning and miracles we had a bus
and passengers loaded for our long trip to
Houston Texas.

The first night in Houston our Wisconsin group gathered to eat dinner. We walked all over downtown Houston not knowing that the downtown area closed at 6:00 pm. It was 6:30 pm and we were starving. As we all walked around, wondering what we should do, we realized that one of us was missing. We couldn't find Kurtis. Looking around we finally spotted him a few blocks back chatting with this homeless man. We all stood on the corner waiting to see what was going on, then we see them both begin walking towards our group. Kurtis approaches and says in a soft low tone "Pastor Eric, can he eat with us?" "Of course he can," I said "if we can find somewhere to eat!" We finally found a pizza restaurant.

As we sat waiting for our food, I saw a group of young people treating this homeless man, Richard, as if he was their best friend, asking him about his past, his family, his previous jobs, education, and even about his heart. Then I noticed that Kurtis was again missing. When he came back he had a plastic bag in his hands. As we ate I noticed Kurtis having a great conversation with Richard. After we were done eating and began to leave, Kurtis asked Richard if he would like to meet for breakfast in the morning, and Richard kindly accepted. I then see Kurtis hand the man the bag. In it was a pair of socks

and sandals. Little did I notice before that the man had a tattered shoe on one foot and a plastic bag on the other. The next morning several of our young people met with Richard and took him to get a pair of shoes, several pairs of socks, and a duffle bag to carry his clothes in. At breakfast they gave Richard a Bible and had a great Bible study with him at McDonalds. He was very grateful that random young people from Wisconsin noticed and cared so much for him that they were willing to spend not just money but time with him.

This random act of kindness caught my attention because while we had all passed by Richard, only one was impressed to stop. Some thought that Richard was just another homeless man, others were intimidated by him, others were afraid of the dirt on his clothing from sleeping on the ground, and others just had no interest in him at all. We all had some former bias or leaning that

kept us walking, except one person in the group. The one that noticed this homeless man's lack of shoes. Kurtis is what you call a "sneakerhead." Sneakerheads love shoes, and look for the wildest and hottest shoes on the market. The Lord used this shoe passion for the Lord's service! Kurtis noticed this man's need and wanted to meet that need because it was a passion to him.

This caught my attention. It reminded me that the Lord can use each of our passions for His service! Just as Kurtis used his love for shoes as a tool to meet a need of a homeless man, I hope we all allow the Lord to use our passions to serve others, whatever that passion may be!

Wear your cheerful face. Be the one who brightens where you are. Share words


of encouragement. We have the privilege of being loved by Jesus. That should bring joy to each of our hearts.

Madison Health Outreach in Monona Terrace Touches 150 Lives



ourty-two volunteers from the Madison
East church and eight other Wisconsin
Adventist churches joined to operate an
8-station Health Screening at the January
20 and 21 Well Expo held in Madison at
Monona Terrace. The screen checked height,
weight, BP, recovery pulse, lung capacitiy,
and personal health habits, then provided
a computerized health-age apprasial, and a
one-on-one coaching session on how each
person could improve their health.

"What do you get out of this?" asked one guest as she eyed the busy 20x20 booth.

"This is amazing," said another, "So often everything sounds like a sales pitch, but you guys are taking the time to listen to our needs and point us in the right direction."

Over 150 people stopped to ask questions, visit volunteers, or check out the health literature, while 121 people completed the entire eight stations. "Thank you for talking about the spiritual part of my life," commented one lady. And another said, "Oh, you are the Seventh-day Adventists. I know all about your health studies. You live longer than most people."

Exhibit coordinator for the 138-booth Well Expo said, "This is the most popular booth of our Expo. We need to give you a bigger space next year."

Joseph Bergeon, event coordinator for the church said, "I hope members catch the vision of what an event like this can do to reach our communities."

Chippewa Valley Shares 1162 Hacksaw Ridge Books in Local Theaters

hirty-two members and friends of the Chippewa Valley Church handed out a total of 1162 "The Hero of Hacksaw Ridge" books at 45 different movie showings during November and December of 2016. This project took place inside a local movie theater as patrons were exiting the film "Hacksaw Ridge." The movie portrays the faithful witness and service of Desmond Doss, an Adventist combat medic in World War II who became the first conscientious objector to receive the US Medal of Honor.

The project began when two families learned about the movie, "Hacksaw Ridge" on 3ABN. Not wanting to let this outreach opportunity to slip away, local church members joined in with donations to purchase the 14 cases of books to share.

Furthermore, due to the request and foresight of the theater owners, the project also became a charitable fundraising event. As patrons left the movie and were offered the book, they were also given the opportunity to donate to a local worthwhile cause: an established program which houses and assists homeless veterans. By the



time the project ended, almost \$3,200 had been raised, and a check for that amount was presented by the theater to the local organization for homeless veterans as local television and newspaper reporters stood by.

When asked about the project, members said they thoroughly enjoyed it and appreciated the opportunity to work together. They had many opportunities to visit movie-goers, give them a book, and thank them for their donations. Patrons thanked the group for raising money for such a good cause, and promised they would read the book! The theater owners themselves were so pleased with the project they hosted a pizza party - for the workers when it was all done.

What started with a little idea by a few folks, and under the direction of the Lord, became something quite a bit bigger.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

s we close out the financial records for 2016 we are showing a tithe increase of 2.64% over 2015 tithe. We were blessed with a trust maturity that helped that tithe figure considerably. Without that extra boost our tithe would have been close to even with last year. We are thankful for all of you who have faithfully supported our conference as well as your local churches and schools this past year. We are also grateful for those who remember us in there estate plans. It is truly a blessing to all.

Our Wisconsin Budget giving was down by 5.78% (-\$18,721) compared with 2015. This offering which totaled \$305,074 is critical for the operation of Wisconsin Academy as well as the funding of evangelism in our conference.

Speaking of evangelism, the conference appropriated evangelism funds of over \$220,000 directly to your local churches in 2016. It is exciting to hear stories about lives that were touched all over Wisconsin as a result of the outreach many of your churches and schools participated in over the year. It is our prayer that many of these ministries will continue into 2017 as we seek to spread the gospel news to our communities throughout the state.

I am also happy to report that the wastewater treatment project at Wisconsin Academy is completed. It is already proving a great blessing in the saving of time and money for the Academy operations.

As you might imagine our budget will once again be very tight as we look into 2017. Rising costs in healthcare, insurance, etc., continue to be a challenge for the conference in the same way that many of your local churches experience it.

Thank you for your faithfulness both in giving of time and funds to see this message go forward. May God keep us all faithful until His soon appearing.




Caleb Minty Accepts Men's Dean Position

Honoring Veterans



adison East invited USS *Indianapolis* survivor Melvin Jacob, Marine Corps Guard and Sun Prairie resident to speak for a special program honoring veterans on November 12. Jacob shared his story of surviving the sinking of the USS *Indianapolis* as James Flood, Madison member, guided him with questions.

Just past midnight on July 30, 1945, the USS *Indianapolis* was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine, sinking the ship in approximately 12 minutes. Jacob was one of 1196 people aboard the ship that was carrying the atomic bomb codenamed "Little Boy." The attack left 900 stranded at sea, exposed to shark attacks, dehydration, hallucinations, and saltwater poisoning. Only 317 survived the horrific 4-day ordeal.

This program allowed our church to say thank you to the veterans, and brought many from the community.
