Is Our Church Involved in Faminie Relief Efforts in Africa?

WISCONSIN Seventh-day Adventists join others from across North America this week in replenishing funds for disaster and famine relief worldwide.

"Though our churches annually give more than a million dollars," says James Hayward, Wisconsin Conference president. "the Adventist Development and Relief Agency (ADRA International) participated in projects valued at \$24.4 million last year.

"That's possible because of many other generous people who believe in ADRA's work," Elder Hayward continues.

ADRA was involved during 1984 in 135 projects. The agency has a presence in 185 countries.

"It's hard to tell how many people we have helped," Hayward says, "but ADRA has programs to feed approximately 500,000 around the world. ADRA encourages food-for-work programs. What we do in many places is to teach people a skill that will improve lives. They learn these skills in exchange for meals."

Elder Hayward says that, as an example, in one South American country where the village was high on the mountainside, the villagers had difficulty reaching each other. ADRA helped them build 164 steps up the mountains for easier access.

In Ethiopia, besides feeding people, ADRA recently conducted a two-week home gardening seminar. The people trained obtained seeds and information that they will use in their villages.

In Africa's Sudan ADRA is beginning a maternal child-care program for children, nursing mothers and pregnant women, providing food and health information to catch malnutrition during the critical years for the child -- from his birth through age 5.

Pay scale for teachers in Cradle Roll and Kindergarten is \$30.00 and for Primary \$40.00. This is full time and would include both Sabbaths.

During Camp Meeting 1984, mention was made in the HIGHLIGHTS of the current need for the campgrounds to have a cement mixer, and would you believe that just hours later the Lord filled our need through faithful members?

Recently, the fifteen Pathfinders and six leaders of the Portage Church district held a TRASH-A-THON. The PORTAGE TRAVELERS PATHFINDER CLUB went throughout the Portage area picking up litter and trash to raise funds for the North American Pathfinder Camporee in Colorado.

The project was well received by the community with over half of the homes and all of the businesses contacted for pledges. Over \$1,100.00 was raised to help with Camporee expenses, and, one businessman encouraged the Pathfinders to "do it again next year."
