# Wisconsin Camp Meeting A Foretaste of Heaven

ince 1867, Wisconsin Adventists have eagerly anticipated our yearly camp meeting. All ages come together from every walk of life to share rich fellowship and draw near to God for nine glorious days.

Before camp meeting officially begins, cars, campers and motorhomes from over 20 states begin arriving at Camp Wakonda, our 220-acre pine forested summer camp, and settle in to over 750 cabins and campsites nestled between two small lakes.

Most visitors love to walk the grounds and trails, enjoying wildflowers, sandhill cranes, white-tailed deer, raccoons, foxes and an occasional bear.

Each year we are deeply nourished by a variety of guest speakers such as U.S. Senate Chaplain Barry Black, Mark Finley, Neil Nedley, Jan Paulsen, and David Ascherick. Music has included the King's Heralds, the Emmanuel Quartet, Michael Harris, and a wide variety of mini-concerts.

Every day is filled with children and youth Bible lessons, games, crafts, community outreach projects, Pathfinder classes, swimming, a gigantic sand box, unicycling, and an ever-busy outdoor basketball court.

Campers enjoy browsing through our 8,000-square-foot Adventist Book Center and tasting food samples from the market.



Mealtime options include the Fireside Lodge Cafeteria, Snack Shack, or relishing a relaxing picnic under shade trees with family, friends, or former classmates.

Throughout the week, you may visit the Nature Center, run or walk in the annual 5K Hallelujah Hustle, or get involved in a variety of community service projects. The highlight as camp meeting concludes each year is seeing 20-30 individuals commit their lives completely to Jesus Christ and be baptized in the waters of our lake.

The first Wisconsin camp meeting in 1867 was held in a cow pasture east of Janesville, with a big meeting tent ordered for \$16. About 1,200 people attended. Since that first pioneer camp meeting,

we have met in 52 different Wisconsin locations. From 1927-1977 camp meeting remained in Portage, and now we meet at Camp Wakonda in Westfield.

Many people have come to Wisconsin camp meeting over the last 152 years, each with similar aspirations; to grow stronger in the Lord, fellowship with other Christians, and delight in a foretaste of heaven's joys.

Why don't you visit Wisconsin camp meeting this year for a day, weekend, or even the full nine days!

Those signs don't often have neatly scripted letters, but instead are in the faces and actions of the members, at the entrance door, the Sabbath School room, the hallways, the sanctuary, and even the fellowship hall.


When I make that all too often visit to a hospital I see signs everywhere letting me know how I can get to the department I am seeking. I can ask for help from any employee whether they are on the elevator, or sitting behind the "Help Desk." Some hospitals even have special "greeters" who are there to hold the door open, to offer a wheelchair, or other assistance. From the activity tables in the waiting rooms for kids,

to the literature in the racks, the sign is clear. We are here for you.

Churches are called to be hospitals for the spiritually hurting people of our communities. I would encourage you as a member of your church, as a Christian who is called to represent Jesus, to look at your sign. What are you telling the church guest, the elderly member, the young person at Sabbath School, or the youth who is just coming back one more time to see if their church believes in them? Maybe your sign needs cleaned up or repainted. Maybe it needs to have a different message. May your sign clearly read, "Jesus is alive. Welcome to His house! We're glad you are here. Our family isn't complete without you."

#### FINANCIAL **UPDATE**

t's hard to believe we are already more than a third of the way through 2019. Though it has been slow in coming, it now appears spring has arrived to stay. What a blessing this time of year is.

As we look at our offerings for 2019 we find a tithe loss of -3.07% (\$-67,012) through March. Wisconsin Budget also shows a loss through March of -12.03% (\$-8,126). While numbers are obviously down, they are compared to last year that started out extra strong.

While we have a decrease of income we are also experiencing a decrease in expenses. It's amazing how God takes care of our budget both in good times and more difficult times.

I was encouraged last week as I attended week of prayer at Wisconsin Academy and witnessed several students rededicate their life to Jesus. Changing lives for a closer walk with Jesus is the reason Wisconsin Academy exists. Thank you for your support of our Academy.

I was also excited to hear that our evangelist Tom Michalski has several guests asking for baptism and attending church even before the series is over. We praise God once again for lives being changed. That too is why our churches exist, to change lives and bring others to Jesus.
