The Wisconsin Conference is committed to helping Wisconsin Academy continue to be a school with high ideals and a positive atmosphere. The Executive Committee, along with Conference leadership, has given strong support to see that the school succeeds in achieving its mission and vision.

The goal to build new dorms is an ambitious one, especially in these challenging times. I am convinced that the hand of God has been with this project from the beginning. Wisconsin Academy Our Heritage

Wisconsin boasts a rich Adventist heritage. The school has fostered spiritual growth, academic learning, and a strong work ethic in the lives of its students. The legacy of this education has been facilitated in the halls of Bethel Academy, Walderly School, and Wisconsin Academy.

Bethel Academy, established in 1899, was the first

secondary institution for Wisconsin Conference young people. The doors opened as Woodland Industrial School, changing to Bethel Industrial Academy in 1902, and then to Bethel Academy in 1914. The plan was for a school that would be easily accessible to young people and be based on the principles of Christian growth and development. The school would also provide a quality academic education.

The academy initially offered only 10 grades with six teachers. In the following two years, monies were raised from the Conference to build another facility for administrative offices, library, and classrooms. By 1917 a substantial library was constructed and the necessary equipment purchased to bring the school to the standards of a 12-grade school.

School life continued at Bethel until 1949 when the campus was relocated to Columbus and renamed Wisconsin Academy.

Walderly School, established in 1908, belonged to the North Wisconsin Conference. The school was located on 400 acres just south of Superior in Hawthorne, Wisconsin.

Life at Walderly was primitive at best, but no one complained. Students were trained in the classic academic subjects while obtaining industrial skills in a Christian environment.

Although Walderly closed its doors in 1927, when North and South were united into a single conference, support for Christian education has not diminished in that area of the state.

In Columbus, construction of the power plant and the girls' dormitory was completed and the school opened September 4, 1949. The one dormitory housed the girls and boys in separate wings. There was a library, several administrative offices, two classrooms, and the cafeteria and dining room. There were two classrooms in the powerhouse and one in a farmhouse on the property.

By September, 1952, one wing of the boys' dormitory was finished. Between 1954 and 1960 a second wing of the boys' dormitory, a gymnasium, and two faculty homes were completed. The Johnson house provided additional housing for three faculty families. In the sixties and early seventies more housing was built for staff.

In 1960 construction of a new administration building was begun, starting with the chapel. During the summer of 1965, a wing was added to house the administrative offices, two classrooms, and a temporary library that is still in operation today.

In 1968 an addition was made to the girls' dormitory to house 42 girls. The classroom at the end of the dormitory was converted into a dean's apartment in 1970.

A new gymnasium was constructed in 1976 and 1977 with the possibilities of further expansion. The new gymnasium would have three classrooms, a weight

room, and various other facilities to enhance the physical education program for our students.

The cafeteria, formerly in the basement of the girls' dorm, was sorely out of date and needed refurbishing. The Wisconsin Conference Constituency voted to proceed with building a new facility that is connected to the gymnasium. On moving day, December 11, 2001, through the generous donations of the alumni and conference constituents, the new cafeteria was opened and dedicated "debt free."

Throughout the development of the facilities (purchased in 1943), the goal has been to enhance the educational opportunities of the students. In the future, plans are to continue to improve the site.

Looking through an alumni roster, you will find names of people who have raised good Christian families, become business owners, conference presidents, pastors, conference departmental directors, college

presidents, principals, teachers, doctors in general practice as well as specialists, nurses, and hospital executives. All of these people have taken advantage of the education at Wisconsin Conference schools and have gone on to make their mark in their families, their communities, and the world.

Together We Can With God

Q Why is our conference in this “Together We Can” program?

A The ultimate goal is to help all of our families discover and act upon God’s will in their lives regarding material things. We will grow spiritually -- both individually and as a conference body -- by applying God’s methods for managing His resources. Our new dorms will be a reminder of the miracles God will perform through yielded lives.

Q Exactly how much money are we trying to raise in this campaign?

A Our goal is \$4.2 million dollars. We have already received \$2.5 million from the sale of our old office property and \$301,000 in donations and commitments towards the new dorm.



Q How will I become better acquainted with the “Together We Can” program?

A There will be a series of four presentations in each Church during April and May. “Together We Can” Sabbath will be May 9, 2009. On that day, there will be a bulletin insert and an informative video presentation. Each member will have the privilege of receiving full information on the project.



Q When will my commitment begin?

A Many have already begun to contribute. A special opportunity to make commitments will occur on May 9, 2009, “Together We Can” Sabbath.

Q Can I change my commitment later on?

A Yes. Some will be blessed so that they can increase their commitment. Unforeseen circumstances might force some to lower their commitment.



Q If I should fall behind on my commitment, will the conference make efforts to make me pay?

A No. You are being asked to pray, asking God what He would have you commit to Him. The only purpose of the cards is to give the conference an indication of approximately how much we can expect, so that we will be able to make realistic plans.

Q What part should I play in this stewardship program?

A Each member of our conference family is asked to diligently seek the Lord regarding his personal commitment... then be obedient to His direction. We believe that God has already arranged sufficient funds to expand Wisconsin Academy. Our obedience may cause us to make a sacrifice initially. In time, however, each person who gives as the Lord directs will see that obedience and sacrifice always result in greater abundance.

Q Have any commitments come in yet?

A We say a special, "Thank you" to those who have already made commitments of over \$300,000 in pledges and donations as of January 30, 2009. The greatest part of fundraising was accomplished with \$2.5 million from the sale of the old Conference Office property in Sun Prairie.

Q Are there other ways I can be part of the "Together We Can" project?

A We are soliciting 1,500 Prayer Warriors for "Together We Can." These prayer warriors will pray everyday for our existing students at the Academy, our prospective students, our staff, our whole Academy program and of course, the dormitory building project. We are making efforts to coordinate with Maranatha International to schedule volunteer labor for the dormitory. If we can make these arrangements, there would be opportunity for volunteer laborers, skilled and unskilled, as well.

NOT EQUAL GIVING...

...BUT EQUAL SACRIFICE

The strength of any campaign is planned and systematic giving. To provide the best opportunity for the greatest participation and achievement of a maximum goal, we have chosen a two year, 104-week plan of giving. Contributors will establish their own schedule of giving--weekly, monthly, or annually. Some have already made their commitments. There will be a special "Together We Can" Sabbath on May 9, 2009. Many others will be making their commitments then.

Our request for planned giving has one fundamental principle: "Not Equal Giving...But Equal Sacrifice." Each church family is unique including the nature of work, the amount of income, and the level of other financial obligations. That is why decisions concerning the amount of the gift rests solely with the family or individual. There will be no "public auction" fundraisers, no request for verbal commitments at special meetings or regular gatherings of the congregation, and no publication of committed amounts. What should you give? There is just one answer to this question--a generous, sacrificial gift. As much as your income will allow. A sufficient amount to represent your gift of appreciation to God as you express thanks for all God has given you. Only you and God can make the right decision. We urge you to make your gift a matter of fervent prayer. A sacrificial gift is one which will require you to:

1. Adjust your lifestyle
2. Rearrange your priorities
3. Actually give up something

Regular giving is extremely important. It is an easy way to make a significant contribution over a long period. You will be amazed by the ultimate total of an amount given systematically over a two year period.

Your commitment will come about as a result of your prayerful consideration of the question, "What does God want me to do?" Our response to the challenge before us must be made on the basis of God's will for each individual.

Pledging our support to "Together We Can" requires a financial commitment above what we give to the regular church budget. Through prayer and a personal commitment to God, each contribution becomes a significant part of this stewardship program.
