All I Ever Needed

s she read one of the poems from her book, Patricia Pierce, member of the Rhinelander Church in Wisconsin, paused to reflect on God's goodness and mercy during her almost 80 years of life. Raised in a very dysfunctional situation by two aunts who considered her a burden, Pierce says the only love she received was from her great-grandmother. "We would often talk together about the Bible," she recalls. "We'd read and discuss what we read, pray, and sing songs together, songs I still sing today."

As Pierce began her own family, she vowed to show her seven children the love she was given by her greatgrandmother. When her oldest daughter, Susie, was 14 years old, Pierce somehow ended up with a pamphlet discussing apocalyptic imagery in Revelation. "We prayed and asked the Lord to explain this puzzling interpretation of Revelation." The next day they saw a billboard for a Revelation Seminar in Racine. Attending together, they double-checked in the Bible what they had heard when they got home.

"We were blown away by the truth," Pierce says. Both baptized after the Seminar, she and Susie began to follow the Bible's guidance, including keeping the Sabbath, which was much easier said than done. Today, Pierce and several of her daughters are church members, and they pray daily for the rest of the family to accept Christ.

In 1999, Pierce, CNA/CHHA, broke her hip and had to retire. She missed work terribly and, after several years, began looking for something to fill that gap in

her life. Having always been interested in medical science, she enrolled in the Contemporary and Alternative Medicine program at Ashford University online, with the goal of becoming a health coach or nutritionist.

Two years in, however, she began to notice changes to her health. "I was drooling, losing my balance, having regular headaches, and not sleeping well," Pierce remembers. Although as a nurse she recognized all the symptoms, that didn't make hearing the doctor's diagnosis any easier. It was Parkinson's disease.

Despite this setback, Pierce was determined to finish what she started and, in 2018, she graduated with a bachelor's degree at the age of 75. Later that same year, she reached another milestone: she

published a book. After a conversation with God about the title, she published, At the Door, under the pen name, Evangeline. This collection of poems and dream vignettes—short stories God gave Pierce in her dreams—started out as prayer journals she intended to leave for her family to read after her death.

"I want my kids to realize God is in charge and be grateful to have Him in their lives," Pierce explains.

"I was talking to Him the other day and He told me, 'Patricia, when you get to Heaven, you'll be surprised by how many people you have brought to the Lord," Pierce shares, her voice wavering as her eyes fill with tears. "I told Him I don't care about the number of stars in my crown; I just want to meet Him. He is

From the President's Desk

Do You Love Me?

John 21 presents the beautiful story about the breakfast by the sea. In a very familiar place for His disciples, Jesus decided to fulfill an essential task before He headed back to heaven. At that time, a few of His disciples joined Peter in fishing all night, but just as they experienced at the beginning of their ministry, they had no success. Once again, Jesus commanded all the fish to hide until given further instructions.

When the disciples decided to give up, they were exhausted, hungry, and possibly disappointed. They had tried everything possible, but it did not turn out how they expected. Once more, they were tempted to question God's providence for them. But when Jesus asked them to cast the net on the right side of the boat, they were amazed by the multitude of fish they caught.

But what happened next was beyond their hope and anticipation. Jesus prepared a fresh breakfast and invited them to sit around the fire and partake of His fish and bread. It all seemed impossible. A miracle!

This story shares a valuable lesson of God's providence, and gives assurance of His presence for years to come. Jesus wanted to remind them about their initial experience when they accepted the call to ministry. Ellen White offers more details about this story's significance:

"It showed them that the death of their Master had not lessened their obligation to do the work He had assigned them. Though they were to be deprived of His personal companionship, and of the means of support by their former employment, the risen Savior would still have a care for them. While they were doing His work, He would provide for their needs. And Jesus had a purpose in bidding them cast their net on the right side of the ship. On that side He stood

upon the shore. That was the side of faith. If they labored in connection with Him, --His divine power combining with their human effort, --they could not fail of success" DA 810.5.

Now, the most crucial mission has to be accomplished after the morning meal. Jesus has a unique challenge for one of His disciples. He looked at Peter and asked: "Simon, son of Jonah, do you love me more than these?" Three times Peter had to hear the same persistent question, one for each of his public betrayals of His Master. The shame and dishonor he brought to Jesus had to be eliminated by a genuine love for Him and care for His precious "lambs and sheep." Ellen White once again offers clarity related to Jesus's intentions:

"Before being called to take up again his apostolic work, he must before them all give evidence of his repentance. Without this, his sin, though repented of, might have destroyed his influence as a minister of Christ. The Savior gave him opportunity to regain the confidence of his brethren, and, so far as possible, to remove the reproach he had brought upon the gospel." DA 811.1

Jesus calls all Seventh-day Adventists in Wisconsin to have "breakfast" with Him. During our upcoming camp meeting week, everyone is invited to bring all their disappointments in life, all their failures in ministry, and experience spiritual, emotional, and physical rejuvenation. Ultimately, all of us are invited to renew our love commitments to God and answer His call to, "feed the lambs and sheep."

Wisconsin Receives \$1.5m Donation



R ecently, the unexpected happened right after our February Conference Executive Committee meeting. During lunch, a man approached me and introduced himself as Mike Maguire. Mike informed me that he was the executor of the Robert Peterson Trust, and he was there to personally deliver the Peterson's gift to the Wisconsin Conference. In fact, there were three gifts: one for the Wisconsin Conference, one for Camp Wakonda, and the third gift to Wisconsin Academy. The three gifts totaling over \$1.5 million!

Mike explained that he knew Mr. Peterson, a successful farmer, having helped him with the business side of his farm for several years. Mike said: "I did the job Mr. Peterson asked me to do, and it took 2.5 years to complete. I didn't want to just mail a check. I wanted the beneficiaries of the Peterson Trust to know who Mr. Peterson was and to personally hear about the potential impact of the gifts that he gave."

Mr. Peterson and his wife Esther were long-time members of the Almond Church and often attended the Wisconsin Rapids church. Mr. Peterson and Esther had no children of their own, but they enjoyed helping kids attend church school and often hired young people to work on the farm. It was also important to them to make it easier for parents to send their children to Wisconsin Academy and Camp Wakonda. Mr. Petersen died in 2019 at the age of 100. What he left behind will make a difference.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

ur annual audit performed by GCAS (General Conference Auditing Services) has just been completed for our 2021 financial year. I am happy to report that we received a clean opinion from GCAS, meaning our accounts fairly and correctly represent the financial condition of our Conference. The audit covers the finances of the Conference and our compliance with NAD (North American Division) policies.

We have just closed the books for March. Tithe thru March is down -3.95% when compared to the same period 2021. The Wisconsin budget shows a similar decrease of -3.31% for the same period. With inflation and the current instability in the economy we are experiencing, we have budgeted conservatively for 2022. We will continue to monitor our finances closely to continue to maintain and even build our reserves to keep our conference stable through uncertain economic times.

At camp meeting we plan to provide full cafeteria service and snack shack food again. We look forward to seeing many of you there and pray for a memorable time together as a conference church family.

We continue preparations for the constituency meeting on October 16, 2022. A special four-year audited financial statement will be prepared for our constituency meeting. These statements will be provided to the delegates for review, and a time to ask any questions concerning them at the constituency meeting.

If your church has not yet turned in the names for delegates and suggested names to be considered for various committees, please do so immediately. We will continue to send information to the delegates ahead of the meeting so they may be prepared for the agenda to be discussed that day. God bless!
