



YOUNG ADULT SPOTLIGHT "Back to the Basics"

n 1961, the Green Bay Packers were struggling. Coach Vince Lombardi walked his team onto the field, held up a ball, and declared, "Gentlemen, this is a football." Sometimes, it takes a crisis to bring us back to what matters most.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, the church faced a crisis. Doors closed, routines vanished, and ministry was suddenly happening over Zoom instead of in sanctuaries. Mental health declined isolation increased, and yet, amid the uncertainty, a deep hunger to know Gód began to surface—especially on college campuses. This provided both an opportunity and a challenge for the church to adapt to new outreach methods.

Before the pandemic, we had three thriving campus ministries in Wisconsin— at UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee, and UW-Stevens Point.
Afterward only one remained, a small, but determined group at the UW-Stevens Point campus.

At Stevens Point, uncertain times led us back to the basics of how Jesus impacted people. We met with students one-on one, teaching them how to read the Bible, pray, navigate friendships, find community, and share their testimonies. This simple discipleship model brought the students stability through a relationship with

God, sparked group growth, and even resulted in a baptism! It demonstrated how the church can effectively reach today's secular environments.

From that foundation, we learned a few key principles:

• Start small. Pray for one person who's seeking Jesus. Walk with them, showing them what it looks like to follow Him in daily life. As they learn, encourage them to do the same for someone else.

• Be a friend. The goal of the relationship is to be present with people and be a friend. They aren't an object or part of your

agenda.
• Go where they are. The more we engage in our community, the more curious they become about us. We went where the students were—playing volleyball, sharing meals, and supporting them in hard times. Hungry for community, they saw it bringing peace and hope to their lives.

• Be faithful with little. Zechariah 4:10 reminds us not to despise the day of small things. Invest in one person, then build small groups.

• Keep Jesus at the center. John 12:32 says, "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to

myself." Teach them to know Jesus first, then delve into deeper topics like prophecies and last day events, which may be difficult to understand.

• Stay adaptable. Listen to the Holy Spirit's still small voice and learn to adjust as needed.

• Train leaders. Staff must be trained and supported to influence the campus, disciple students, and grow campus "church plants." This mission requires full-time involvement to yield the best impact. Thanks to a generous grant, we've provided public campus ministry staff for multiple campuses.

• Create campus houses. We've run one at UW-Stevens Point for nine years. It provides an example of Christ-like living, houses staff, and serves as a training base and ministry hub. This spring, it hosted a Creation vs. Evolution event, Sabbath Bible studies, leadership training, and more.

We wanted to expand from UW-Stevens Point's—but how? After earnest prayer and planning, this project was launched at several new campuses, with chapters at UW-La Crosse, UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee, and UW-Oshkosh. Committed staff at each location now foster an environment where students meet Jesus

and connect with local churches. Here are stories from two of our campus ministry leaders.

At UW-Madison last fall, a few of us decided to revive our Adventist Christian Fellowship (ACF) chapter. "We had no idéa what we were doing," Slava Cherempei, Madison's student leader, admitted, "but we had abundant support—from our local church, our pastor, and Wisconsin PCM coordinator, Josh Guerrero." We began with fun social events to build connections, but something was missing "Many attěndees weren't truly seeking God; they were there for fun. We hadn't even started anything spiritually substantial yet." When only one person came to a game night, it became a brěakina point—and a turning point. Surrendering it all to God, we launchĕd a Bible study. That same week, five new students

signed up—and most came. "It allowed me to see God work in our hearts on a personal level," Slava says. "It's been an incredible journey."

At UW-Milwaukee, we witnessed prayer transform lives as we relaunched ACF with just a few faithful students and little structure. "We prayed over empty chairs, over uncertain hearts, and over each other. And God answered. says Jonathan Acosta, missionary staff. One student, new to ministry, grew into a faithful prayer leader. Another student shared in a heartfelt speech that ACF was "the answer to a prayer he once whispered to God alone." United by fellowship, scripture, and prayer, we served our community by feeding hundreds. Jonathan sums it up: "This isn't just a club. This is where God met us and shaped us."

College students are just looking for someone to walk alongside them, listen, and be there for them. Someone to provide them the space to ask questions, grow, and learn about God as they navigate adulting. Mańy will become sociéty's leaders in businéss, healthcare, and government. Public Campus Ministry is essential to the church's mission of spreading the everlasting Gospel. It equips young people to impact the world and build God's kingdom.

COVID shut down our churches, hurt many lives, caused social isolation, and shook the next generation's sense of hope for the future. While it may have shut down the building, it didn't shut down the people. It taught us a more practicăl and personal way of doing ministry. VEHICLES:

Park only one vehicle at your designated campsite, facing out. Park additional vehicles in designated parking lots. Vehicles are to remain parked unless needed for entering/leaving camp. NO CRUISING. Vehicles parked in undesignated areas may be towed at owner's expense. Cars may not be used to sleep in overnight. Campground speed limit is 10 mph as posted. Vehicles are not to be left on the grounds after camp meeting and may be removed at owner's expense.

MOTORBIKES: All motorbikes must be licensed with DMV registration and ridden only on designated roads on the main campground side.

Electric Vehicles: A Level 2 Charging station is available in Westfield, near It's Poppin' store. Please plan to charge your vehicle off campus. For onsite needs, please speak with Camp Ranger, Elgin Ziesmer, to make arrangements.

GOLF CARTS:

Golf carts are allowed for the transportation of disabled persons only. All golf carts must be registered at the Administration Office and checked in upon arrival. Security personnel will issue registration sticker that must be displayed at all times. Golf cart drivers must be 18 or older and hold a valid license. Golf carts must be driven in a safe manner. All passengers must stay seated in designated seats while cart is in motion. Persons may not get on or off a golf cart while it is in motion. Person for whom the cart is registered must be on the cart at all times while it is moving.

BEACH:

Swimming is allowed only in supervised, designated beach area at Sandow Lake.

Children 12 years of age and under must be accompanied by an adult. Modest, one piece or tankini swim suits, covering the midriff area, are required. Cover-ups must be worn to/from beach. Swim schedule is listed on page 15. Beach is closed all other times.

Fishing is allowed at Mud Lake, sunrise to sunset.

ADVERTISING:

Private selling, soliciting or fund raising during camp meeting is prohibited.
Obtain stamped approval for all postings at the Communication Office, open 9:00 am - Noon, Mon. - Fri. or hours as posted.
Approved announcements can be hung in these designated areas:

- Four block restroom bulletin boards
- · Communication Office
- The LightHouse Bookstore
- Administration Building

SERVICE ANIMALS:

The only animals permitted at camp meeting will be Service Animals that have been registered with the Administration Office and checked in with camp security upon arrival. Service Animals are individually trained to provide necessary assistance to individuals with disabilities. We follow federal and state accommodation laws. Service Animals must be controlled and supervised by their handler at all times and are not permitted to roam freely within the campground. Emotional

support animals do not qualify as Service Animals.

PETS

For the health and safety of all campers, pets are NOT to be at camp meeting. If you bring a pet, you will be required to take it elsewhere. If you cannot leave your pet at home, the following kennels are nearby.

CURFEW:

All campers are to be quiet and in camping areas by 10:30 pm Sun - Fri. 1st Saturday night curfew is 11:00 pm. Second Saturday night is 11:30 pm. All property south of County Rd. E is off limits after 9:00 pm. WI-FI shuts off at 10:30pm.

CHILDREN:

Children must be supervised at all times. Pick up children within 10 min. of the close of their scheduled program. Parents with Beginner or Kindergarten aged children, please pick up ID wristbands from your division leader to aid in the event a child becomes lost.

ARRIVAL/DEPARTURE:

Gates will be locked at curfew and reopen at sunrise. All camp entries and exits must check in/out with Gatehouse Security.

Prior approval must be obtained to stay nights outside normal camp meeting days. Additional daily rate charges will apply. Be aware utilities may be interrupted due to camp set-up. If you need to drop off your trailer or RV early, please do so after the Work-

Bee and before camp pitch. Please schedule a time with the camp office prior to your arrival.

Remove all RV's, trailers, and tents at the end of camp meeting. If you plan to leave an RV or trailer, the current storage fee is due by the last business day in July.

Refrigerators must not be left outside after camp meeting. A \$50 removal fee will apply.

SPECIAL NOTICE: Due to State Licensing regulations, personal items must be taken home after camp meeting. Any personal items left will be subject to removal. The conference/campground is not responsible for lost or damaged items.

NO ITEMS MAY BE LEFT UNDER A CABIN. Violation of these regulations may result in loss of reservation as Camp Wakonda could be subject to license suspension.

CAMPSITE RENTAL:

Each campsite is designed for one family only. Rental of a campsite is for the duration of camp meeting only and shall not be designated or used by anyone as a legal residence.

It is Camp Management's desire to have all sites used every year to allow as many people as possible to attend camp meeting. To accomplish this, annual subletting will be necessary. For safety reasons all subletting MUST be processed through the Reservation Office. Private subletting forfeits the right to reserve the following year. Please submit sublet notifications to campmeeting@ wi.adventist.org.

Any site (cabin or RV) found to be unused without notification, even if paid for, may be subject to reassignment.

All reservations for the next year must be made with 50% payment by the last business day in July and full payment by April 1st. Any site not reserved by the last business day of July, will be made available to others the following year.

Transfer of money for cancellations after May 26 is subject to ability to sublet the site.

Any renter shall lose the right to re-rent or remain in any accommodation if it is found to be occupied by children or young people, unmarried and/or under age 20, without proper chaperonage as defined by the Camp Meeting Management Committee.

Any renter shall lose the right to re-rent or remain in a campsite if found to be in violation of any of the principles of the Seventh-day Adventist Church.

Electrical service is limited.

Please limit simultaneous use of air conditioners, microwaves, hotplates, etc. especially during hot weather. No sewer, water, gas, or electrical lines or connections, temporary or permanent, may be added to those originally provided by the camp.

For safety, a working fire extinguisher is recommended for each site.

Cabins and campsites are owned and maintained by the Wisconsin Conference and are used by the constituents throughout the year for many events. As such, renters are not to make physical changes to their cabin/campsite without prior approval from the Camp Manager.

Cabin locks are maintained by the camp. See Reservations to obtain the code for your cabin lock. Private locks will be removed.

Cabins are required by Wisconsin State law to maintain a working smoke alarm. If there are problems with your smoke alarm, please fill out a work order at the information desk in the Administration Office.

PROHIBITED

- Charcoal grilling, wood fires or open flame of any kind.
- Playing instruments without approval and/ or in a way bothersome to neighbors.
- Playing with water-toys, water balloons, etc. except in designated areas and times.
- Using other people's property beyond camp boundaries, including beach/lakefront.
- Dangerous items such as guns (including paintball and airsoft) and fireworks/ firecrackers of any kind.

- Bicycles, skateboards, unicycles, ATVs, UTVs, or other wheeled transportation except in designated areas and times.
- 7. Removing pine needles around campsites & cabins. Pine needles prevent erosion.
- Harmful substances such as tobacco, alcohol and illicit drugs.
- 9. Per health code, no dishes, pots, or pans are to be scraped, cleaned, or washed at the water spigots.
